The Source of Trials and Temptations

There's always a bit of confusion in the use of the biblical terms trials and temptations. The words are used synonymously of trial such as suffering, or temptation to commit sin. Trials can refer to persecution, or disease, or affliction, or imprisonment, or suffering loss, or enticement to do evil. They mean the same thing. In both the Old and New Testament these words are used interchangeably. They are synonyms. The difference is in the purpose and author of the test, trial, temptation, or trouble.

Satan = tempts, trips, torments, <u>to destroy</u> faith **God** = tries, tests, proves, <u>to strengthen</u> faith by fire

God does not tempt us, but He allows us to be tempted, tried, and tested. His purpose is never to destroy our faith, but to make it strong.

Satan is always seeking to destroy faith through heaping on trials, troubles, tests, torments, diseases, persecutions, losses, etc.

James 1:2-4

Consider it pure joy, my brothers, whenever you <u>face trials of many kinds</u>, ³ because you know that the <u>testing of your faith develops perseverance</u>. ⁴ Perseverance must finish its work so that you may be <u>mature and complete</u>, <u>not lacking anything</u>.

James 1:12-15

<u>Blessed is the man who perseveres under trial</u>, because when he has stood the test, he will receive the crown of life that God has promised to those who love him. ^{13.} <u>When tempted, no one should say, "God is tempting me." For God cannot be tempted by evil, nor does he tempt anyone; ^{14.} but <u>each one is tempted when, by his own evil desire, he is dragged away and enticed.</u> ^{15.} Then, after desire has conceived, it gives birth to sin; and sin, when it is full-grown, gives birth to death.</u>

Matthew 4:1

Then Jesus was led by the Spirit into the desert to be tempted by the devil.

Matthew 6:13

And <u>lead us not into temptation</u>, but <u>deliver us from the evil one</u>.

1 Peter 1:3-9

Praise be to the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ! In his great mercy he has given us new birth into a living hope through the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead, ⁴ and into an inheritance that can never perish, spoil or fade--kept in heaven for you, ⁵ who through faith are shielded by God's power until the coming of the salvation that is ready to be revealed in the last time. ⁶ In this you greatly rejoice, though now for a little while you may have had to suffer grief in all kinds of trials. ⁷ These have come so that your faith--of greater worth than gold, which perishes even though refined by fire-may be proved genuine and may result in praise, glory and honor when Jesus Christ is revealed. ⁸ Though you have not seen him, you love him; and even though you do not see him now, you believe in him and are filled with an inexpressible and glorious joy, ⁹ for you are receiving the goal of your faith, the salvation of your souls.

1 Peter 4:12-19

Dear friends, do not be surprised at the painful trial you are suffering, as though something strange were happening to you. ^{13.} But rejoice that you participate in the sufferings of Christ, so that you may be overjoyed when his glory is revealed. ^{14.} If you are insulted because of the name of Christ, you are blessed, for the Spirit of glory and of God rests on you. ^{15.} If you suffer, it should not be as a murderer or thief or any other kind of criminal, or even as a meddler. ^{16.} However, if you suffer as a Christian, do not be ashamed, but praise God that you bear that name. ^{17.} For it is time for judgment to begin with the family of God; and if it begins with us, what will the outcome be for those who do not obey the gospel of God? ^{18.} And, "If it is hard for the righteous to be saved, what will become of the ungodly and the sinner?" ^{19.} So then, those who suffer according to God's will should commit themselves to their faithful Creator and continue to do good.

The Apostle Paul Excelled in Synonyms

Romans 8:35-39 Who shall separate us from the love of Christ? shall <u>tribulation</u>, or <u>distress</u> <4730>, or <u>persecution</u>, or <u>famine</u>, or <u>nakedness</u>, or <u>peril</u>, or <u>sword</u>?... ^{38.} For I am convinced that neither death nor life, neither <u>angels</u> nor <u>demons</u>, neither the <u>present</u> nor the <u>future</u>, nor any <u>powers</u>, ^{39.} neither <u>height</u> nor <u>depth</u>, nor <u>anything else in all creation</u>, will be able to separate us from the love of God that is in Christ Jesus our Lord.

2 Corinthians 4:7-10

But we have this treasure in jars of clay to show that this all-surpassing power is from God and not from us. ⁸. We are hard pressed on every side, but not crushed; perplexed, but not in despair; ⁹ persecuted, but not abandoned; struck down, but not destroyed. ¹⁰ We always carry around in our body the death of Jesus, so that the life of Jesus may also be revealed in our body.

2 Corinthians 6:4-10

Rather, as servants of God we commend ourselves in every way: in great endurance; in troubles, hardships and distresses; ^{5.} in beatings, imprisonments and riots; in hard work, sleepless nights and hunger; ^{6.} in purity, understanding, patience and kindness; in the Holy Spirit and in sincere love; ^{7.} in truthful speech and in the power of God; with weapons of righteousness in the right hand and in the left; ^{8.} through glory and dishonor, bad report and good report; genuine, yet regarded as impostors; ^{9.} known, yet regarded as unknown; dying, and yet we live on; beaten, and yet not killed; ^{10.} sorrowful, yet always rejoicing; poor, yet making many rich; having nothing, and yet possessing everything.

2 Corinthians 12:7-10

To keep me from becoming conceited because of these surpassingly great revelations, there was given me a thorn in my flesh, a messenger of Satan, to torment me. ⁸ Three times I pleaded with the Lord to take it away from me. ⁹ But he said to me, "My grace is sufficient for you, for my power is made perfect in weakness." Therefore I will boast all the more gladly about my weaknesses, so that Christ's power may rest on me. ¹⁰ That is why, for Christ's sake, I delight in weaknesses, in insults, in hardships, in persecutions, in difficulties. For when I am weak, then I am strong.

Take some time to look over the <u>Word Studies</u> of "*Trials and Temptations*" in both the Old and New Testaments. Doing a word search, especially using the original language sources is a great way to discover new revelations of truth for yourself.
